3. Equipping the whole people of God - expanding the scope of the College's work to equip the whole people of God for changing contexts for ministry, mission and discipleship.

This Course guide reflects the growing scope of educational and formation opportunities being offered or promoted by Pilgrim. See the online Uniting Learning courses (see pages 29 and 30) that are designed for lay leaders and ministry staff. Once again we're introducing new professional development options for people serving in ministry, lay or ordained. About Our Courses

What would you like to study?

As a College of the University of Divinity, Pilgrim offers a range of undergraduate and postgraduate awards, which can be undertaken on a full-time or part-time study load, to suit one's availability.

For undergraduate enrolment, committing to a full-time study load is equivalent to enrolling on four undergraduate units of study or 72 undergraduate points in one semester. A part-time load can be an enrolment in one unit of study a semester.

For those pursuing postgraduate studies, study programs from the Graduate Certificates to the Master's level, a full-time study load requires enrolment in three postgraduate units or up to a maximum of 72 points in a semester, and if a part-time study load is preferred, at least a unit enrolment per semester is required.

Undergraduate Awards

These awards are suitable for those who do not already have a degree, are keen to study theology at an undergraduate level, or have not studied at a university level for some time.

Undergraduate Certificate in Divinity

The Undergraduate Certificate in Divinity empowers students to delve into theological, philosophical, and ministry-related studies. This is an undergraduate qualification suitable for those exploring new knowledge or developing an existing one for vocational and professional pursuits.

Diploma in Theology

The Diploma in Theology is a good course to take if you want to study the Bible and Christian history and theology. It is an excellent entry point into further undergraduate studies.



Advanced Diploma in Theology and Ministry

The Advanced Diploma in Theology and Ministry builds on the Diploma of Theology by developing your knowledge and skills in Bible, history, and theology. The award also includes studies in Missiology, Liturgy and Ministry.

Bachelor of Ministry

This undergraduate degree focusses especially on skills relating to ministry practice.

Bachelor of Theology

This undergraduate degree provides an excellent introduction to theology across a range of areas of study. It is a good award to enrol in if you are committed to serving in the church, or deepening your understanding of Christian faith, discipleship, and mission.

Postgraduate Awards

These awards are suitable for those who already have a degree in theology or in another discipline.

Graduate Certificate in Leadership

The Graduate Certificate in Leadership is designed for both new and experienced leaders wishing to consolidate their learning, challenge their assumptions and underpinning knowledge and skills, and explore ways to develop their leadership influence skills in their teams and workplaces.

Graduate Certificate in Divinity

This award is ideal if you have studied theology before but want to update your knowledge, deepen your understanding, or develop expertise in one or more areas of theology. It provides significant flexibility in the choice of units.

Graduate Certificate in Research Methodology

This award is for those who are exploring the possibility of taking a Higher Degree by Research at the University. It equips students with cutting edge research skills applicable to identifying a research topic, developing and writing a research proposal, collecting and evaluating research material and writing a dissertation.

Graduate Certificate in Theology

The Graduate Certificate in Theology is a good course to take if you already have a degree but want to study the Bible and Christian history and theology. It is an excellent way to begin your theological studies, and you can use the credit you gain to enrol in a Graduate Diploma or Masters award.





Graduate Diploma in Divinity

Graduate Diploma in Theology

The Graduate Diploma in Theology is a good course to take if you already have a degree but want to study the Bible and Christian history and theology. It is an excellent entry point into further postgraduate studies.

Master of Divinity

This postgraduate degree provides an excellent introduction to theology across a range of areas of study. It is a good course to take if you already have a degree and are committed to serving in the church, or deepening your understanding of Christian faith, discipleship, and mission.

Master of Theological Studies

This postgraduate award gives you a chance to develop a range of skills and depth of understanding in theological studies. It is for those who already have a degree in another subject but want a longer programme of theological study other than a Graduate Certificate or Graduate Diploma.

Master of Theology

This postgraduate degree is for those who have a degree in theology or ministry. It is aimed at those seeking to expand their knowledge in theological studies.



Higher Degree by Research Awards

These awards are for anyone who has completed theological studies and who meets the admissions criteria for a research degree. They are ideal for anyone who wants to undertake a substantial research project, under the supervision of Pilgrim's excellent Faculty.

Master of Philosophy

This research degree is suitable for those working in any theological field that can be completed in no more than 40,000 words.

Doctor of Philosophy

This research degree is suitable for those working on major research projects in any theological field that can be completed in no more than 100,000 words.

Unit Description

The Book of Psalms is poetry which erupts at moments of emotional intensity; a transcript from real life; poetical accompaniment to real events and real experiences. The Psalms are human attempts to express thought, anger, joy, thanksgiving, lament, doubt, and more to God. Journey through the Psalms and learn about Hebrew poetic literature, poetic devices, the formation and development of the Psalter and the range of forms, structures and settings. Equip yourself with knowledge of the theological themes and explore the relevance, use and functions of the Psalms in today's context and for preaching.

Are you curious about why we have four Gospels? Would you like to explore some of the contradictions within the New Testament, and learn more about Paul's letters? In this course we study a range of New Testament texts, attending to the political and historical settings from which they emerge. We will investigate questions of context, literary style, gender, and audience and along the way we will engage with ancient and contemporary questions of interpretation. Whether you are a person of faith or an agnostic person, you are welcome to join us as we examine this astonishing collection of texts.

Unit Description

The Book of Revelation is a highly political and justiceoriented text that speaks to a range of ancient and contemporary issues. This unit offers a close exegetical study of the Revelation in its historical and political setting. Particular attention will be given to the visual context of Revelation, noting how the author of Revelation utilises and critiques ancient statuary, visual rhetoric and imperial iconography to expose evil and offer an alternate vision of God's reign.

Unit Description

This unit provides an in-depth study of Mark's Gospel. It will focus on exegesis of key passages in this gospel and equip students with the ability to critically engage with primary and secondary sources. Particular attention will be given to narrative and literary critical methodologies and their value for gospel and Markan studies. In addition, this unit will ground Mark's Gospel within various contexts. Consideration will be given to the contexts of Jewish and Greco-Roman history, culture, and worldviews in the first century CE. Particular



attention will be paid to issues of gender, power, cosmology, ethnicity, Christology, and soteriology.

Unit Description

Can the Bible contribute meaningfully to contemporary discussions about a range of ethical or moral issues? This unit will examine how the Bible might inform ethical thinking about a range of issues such as family and marriage, health and (dis)ability, war, violence, decisions about the beginning and end of life, the environment, family and marriage, wealth, and social justice. We will consider how the biblical texts might have spoken about such issues in their ancient contexts and the hermeneutical complexities and constraints when it comes to applying biblical teachings to the modern context.

Unit Description

This unit equips you to tell histories of the land on which your congregation lives and worships.

It focuses on seeking understanding and on respecting Country. It examines the deep history of First Nations peoples, the recent history of colonial settlement, congregational history writing, and the challenges and hopes for the contemporary church on Aboriginal land.

You will be introduced to methods of historical research and the skills you need to interpret legal, theological, and local historical sources.

This unit walks with you as you research, write and reflect on the legacies of the past in the present.

Unit Description

In this unit you will explore the history of peace and justice in movements led by women and lay people. The unit focuses on Australia and the Pacific in the 19th to mid-20th century but also considers transnational influences. It includes topics such as the rise of church-based welfare, labour, Temperance, pacifism, support for mothers and children, justice for First Nations peoples, and environmentalism.

You'll interpret diverse historical sources such as newspapers and advertising, poems and novels, theological text and archival records. Through historical research and theological reflection, you'll deepen your understanding of the work of women and lay people toward peace and justice.

Unit Description

This unit examines shifting and emerging perspectives on the church, comparing them with traditional formulations and narratives. It invites us to recognise how shifting religious allegiances in Australia and around the world have changed the nature of the church.

Amid observed change, it asks how we might explore calls for unity and ensure the church remains visible and relevant. We will explore the ways these questions have been asked in different times and places since the time of the apostles.

Ultimately, we will consider how the church continues to be a faithful witness to Jesus Christ in our time and place.

Christianity's Big Ideas will help you to develop your understanding of pivotal doctrines of God, Christology, Pneumatology, Creation, humanity, salvation, church and hope.

Unit Description

This unit will explore the origins and contemporary significance of the doctrine of the Trinity. Key historical developments in the Eastern and Western traditions will be surveyed. Against this historical background, the re-emergence of the doctrine of the Trinity in the twentieth century will be explored. Attention will be paid to the role which this doctrine is playing in the global church's encounter with modern atheism, religious pluralism, global inequality and issues around gender and sexuality.

Unit Description

This unit explores queer theology as it has emerged from queer theory, LGBTIQ justice struggles, and faith development and practice. It will acquaint students with the history and challenges of the term 'queer', and introduce the multiplicity of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, and queer Christian theologies that have emerged in recent decades. It will seek to analyse and critique theological loci and motifs of Christian theology, including the queering of scripture and hermeneutics and key theological doctrines. Exploring intersectional approaches, including postcolonial perspectives, queer art, action and contemporary reflection, participants will be enabled to assess critically the value and possibilities of queer theology for faith and society today.

This will include a careful evaluation of their contributions. Attention shifts to communal practices, such as hospitality, evangelism, liturgy and proclamation, as forms of discipleship in witness. The unit intends to give both theoretical and practical direction for the development of congregational witness and all-age growth.

Graduate Certificate in Leadership

Developing leadership skills for church, community, and workplace

The Graduate Certificate in Leadership is designed for both new and experienced leaders wishing to consolidate their learning, challenge their assumptions and underpinning knowledge and skills, and explore ways to develop their leadership influence skills in their teams and workplaces.

Students undertake a series of coursework units which may include a project unit, integrating critical thinking and engagement with theoretical, religious, and spiritual beliefs with a body of knowledge and lived experience. This is done through enquiry-based studies, case studies from leading professionals to address workplace problems and issues, that may lead to practical applications for change in their professional context.

Two core units, Self Leadership and Leading Others, are provided online each year through Uniting College Theology and Leadership, Adelaide. Two elective units complete the Graduate Certificate, including Pilgrim's Intercultural Leadership (2026), Uniting Church Theology and History (2027), and Spiritual Care: Senior Practitioner / Grief and Conflict.

The Synod of Victoria and Tasmania will be offering significant scholarships for Uniting Church leaders enrolled in the Graduate Certificate in Leadership in 2026.

- 1. Analyse and synthesise relevant information and concepts that may include perspectives from religious beliefs and spiritual traditions.
- Articulate specialised knowledge of leadership theories and frameworks that may include perspectives from religious beliefs and spiritual traditions to inform leadership practice in complex contexts.
- 3. Communicate, both orally and in writing, leadership ideas and decisions in logical, relevant ways.
- 4. Critically reflect on and respond appropriately to theological, religious, social, cultural, ethical and / or sustainability issues from a leadership perspective.
- 5. Participate, contribute, and actively collaborate with other professionals to facilitate healthy organisational development and transformation.





Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision

Empowering supervisors in ministry, health, education, and leadership

Graduate studies in Professional Supervision equip you to practice as a professional supervisor of individuals and groups who work in caring professions such as ministry, health, education and leadership.

Through experiential learning, you develop skills in professional supervision to create a relationship of trust and transparency in which those being supervised can review their work practices. Using a range of knowledge and techniques, professional supervision can enable the supervisee to develop self-awareness, resilience, ethical understanding, accountability, and effectiveness.

At Pilgrim, you can pursue a Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision as part of an innovative collaboration between colleges of the University of Divinity. This program is recognised as a Registered Supervisor Training Program by the Australasian Association of Supervision (AAOS).

Students have the choice between enrolling in Professional Supervision or the Professional Supervision for Spiritual Directors (Emmaus Stream). The units of study are available either in-person or online via Zoom.

The Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision can be completed part-time over a maximum of two years, while the Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision (Emmaus Stream), designed for those supervising Spiritual Directors, can be completed part-time within one year. Graduates of either program can continue their studies toward the Graduate Diploma in Professional Supervision.

Uniting Learning Units

Courses designed for discipleship and leadership development

Uniting Learning units are Synod-accredited units designed to provide formation and learning for anyone in the Uniting Church wishing to grow in their understanding and skills around the Bible, theology, preaching and worship. The units offer education pathways for all people, including those engaged with the Ministry of Lay Preacher and Ministry of Pastor. They provide a low intensity entry into theology and ministry education for anyone wanting to learn more without the commitment of a longer tertiary education award.

In 2026, Pilgrim will be expanding these offerings with new units designed to support people in pastoral care, and organisation and administration roles. These units are taught remotely via Zoom, with written material, videos and interactive activities provided on the online Uniting Learning platform.

Pilgrim provides certificates of participation (for audit) and certificates of completion (for assessment). We work collaboratively and consultatively with Presbyteries and congregations across the Synod, as well as working closely with the Synod's Lay Preacher Association.

Pilgrim offers a wide array of courses suitable for ongoing professional development and continuing education, including postgraduate programs. It is also possible to audit a unit, at a reduced cost, which means you attend the lectures/seminars and participate fully, except for completing assessment tasks. Invite a colleague or two to join you, and commit to meeting in a peer learning group afterwards for 3-6 months to reflect on your learning in the context of your ministry practice (details in the next column).

We offer a range of programs, many online, most in-person, and some in your region. We can help you tailor a course or program for your Presbytery or region. We can also help you learn more about your learning styles, or help you plan your own continuing education. We encourage people in ministry, ordained and lay, to join peer learning groups where they can encourage each other in their learning and ministry.

We offer a wide range of grants and scholarships. Some are focused on people enrolling in University of Divinity courses at Pilgrim Theological College, both undergraduate and postgraduate. The Uniting Church also has a range of grants and scholarships for members, ministers and pastors undertaking continuing education, whether that be informal or formal study.



Frequently asked questions

Common questions about programs, support, and enrolment at Pilgrim

What can I study at Pilgrim?

At Pilgrim Theological College you can study for either a University of Divinity award or a Pilgrim Certificate.

Uniting Learning subjects will lead to Pilgrim Certificates. Studies in Pilgrim's University of Divinity units will enable you to complete a University of Divinity certificate, diploma, or degree including a Masters or PhD. The subjects include Biblical Studies, Ministry, History, Theology, Philosophy, Liturgy, Missiology, Spirituality, Pastoral Care and more.

There are three ways to engage with these offerings. You can enrol in a full award (a certificate, diploma or degree), choose a single subject for academic credit, or "audit" for full participation without formal assessment requirements.

Who will teach me?

What are classes at Pilgrim like?

We educate, form and equip people through challenging and inspiring classroom experiences. We aim to ignite your critical thinking skills, stir your imagination, and foster deeper understanding. We help you connect your learning to contemporary issues to make a just and compassionate world.

You will learn alongside colleagues with a wide range of religious and ideological viewpoints and diverse cultural heritages. Some may be delving into a subject to expand their faith or professional interest, while others are driven by intellectual curiosity. You will find yourself in a secure and friendly environment that values independent thought and encourages the exploration of different perspectives. Whether you're participating in classes online or on campus, the focus is on fostering meaningful interactions that lead to successful learning experiences for every student.

You can look forward to weekly classes scheduled in the morning, afternoon, or evening throughout the semesters or as intensives that are scheduled over a shorter period. Most classes are designed for in-person or online interaction, and all are supported by online resourcing and our fantastic library facilities.

Units of study are available in-person or online.

In-person: Students attend the campus at the

scheduled time.

Online: Students attend the class remotely

via Zoom at the scheduled time.

Some classes are offered as both online and in-person, so students will engage with one another using the large screens in our well-equipped classrooms.

The timetable shows the method of delivery for each unit and sometimes offers multiple options, allowing you to choose the mode that is most convenient for you. If you need more information or guidance, the Registrar's Office is more than happy to provide assistance.

What is a Pilgrim Learning Hub?

The Pilgrim Learning Hubs are vibrant, collaborative learning communities that provide invaluable face-to-face support for online students residing in the same geographical area. These hubs were initiated by UCA congregations in suburban Heidelberg. Envisioning a broader reach, Pilgrim hopes to establish similar hubs across the Synod.

If you are eager to connect with a local hub or are interested in establishing a hub in your vicinity, please reach out to the Registrar for more information and assistance.

What support will I receive if I enrol in University of Divinity units?

As a student, your learning will be supported by the Dalton McCaughey Library (DML), the University of Divinity Library hub. Additionally, through a partnership with the University of Melbourne, you can access printed resources at the University of Melbourne libraries.

Pilgrim offers a wide range of online resources and in-person support to help with specific study skills and provide guidance on assessments. In addition, individual assistance is available via the DML and, for longer-term assistance, via a Student Support Plan.

To enhance the learning experience, Pilgrim, through the University of Divinity, utilises a web-based Learning Management System called ARK. This platform is tailored to efficiently organise and oversee unit resources, promote student interactions, foster active participation, and simplify the process of submitting assessments. How much will it cost?

The Uniting Learning subjects are available for \$50, apart from the free introduction session.

As a college of the University of Divinity, the Pilgrim course fee for University units follows the university's fee schedule and all associated provisions on fees, as outlined in the university's **Fee Policy**.

In 2026, the cost of an 18-point undergraduate unit is A\$2,184, and a 24-point postgraduate unit is A\$3,384. Both international and domestic fees are the same, however, an additional application fee of A\$300 applies to international students. For detailed information about the 2026 Schedule of Student Tuition Fees.

Australian citizens can use the Higher Education Loan Program or Fee-Help to cover the tuition fees. To check the criteria and your **eligibility to use Fee-Help**, please visit the website by following the link.

Full-time domestic students may qualify for *Austudy* through Centrelink. For **Austudy eligibility** and conditions, please visit the Department of Human Services website by following the link provided.

Pilgrim's units of study are open for professional development or personal enrichment through audit enrolment. Auditing a unit means undertaking the study program without completing formal assessment. In 2026, the audit fee is \$450 for individuals or a fee of \$1000 to cover up to 6 audit enrolments at a hub.

A number of bursaries and scholarships are available through the University of Divinity and the Uniting Church in Australia.

To enrol in University of Divinity units, contact our Registrar Erlinda Loverseed. She will talk you through the options. If you are interested in coursework studies, she will advise you or put you in touch with the Academic Dean. For those pursuing a Higher Degree by Research, the Registrar will connect you with the Research Coordinator or a potential supervisor in your field of study.

In the next phase of the enrolment process, you will have an opportunity to participate in a personalised interview. This interview is designed to assist you in discerning your options and to help you determine your fit with the programs available, as well as to clarify and refine your educational and career objectives. The interview can be conducted over the phone or via video call, or in-person.

We'll ensure that you select a course that aligns with your individual needs and interests, while also meeting the requirements of your selected program of study.

Finally, the third step includes completing and submitting the application form, along with the required supporting documents. Throughout this stage, the Registrar will offer guidance and support.
